## Time in a Bottle

Words and music by Jim Croce



Although Jim Croce was only 30 years old when he died in a plane crash in September 1973, his music lives on. "Time in a Bottle" (written for his son, musician Adrian James Croce) first appeared on the 1972 album You Don't Mess Around with Jim. Released as a single in the fall of 1973, it became a posthumous hit, reaching number one on the


Billboard charts.

Croce's intricate arrangements were based in part on the interplay between his guitar and the guitar of his close friend and accompanist, Maury Muehleisen, who often capoed to a higher position to complement Croce's part. This transcription features both guitar parts, with Muehleisen's guitar capoed at the fifth fret. The standard notation staves show notes at their actual pitches, but the tab numbers for

Muehleisen's part (Guitar 2) are written relative to the capo (for example, "1" denotes a string fretted just above the capo, on the sixth fret). If you don't have an accompanist, stick to Croce's part for a great solo arrangement.

The song opens on a Dm arpeggio with a descending bass line, as seen in measures 1–5. At the verse (measure 9), Croce alters his arpeggio pattern slightly, playing the first and second strings together. At measure 27, there's a key change to the parallel major (from D minor to D major), emphasizing the bittersweet lyric of the chorus. For the song's outro, Muehleisen plays open-string harmonics in measures 44, 46, and 48. To sound the harmonics, touch the fourth and fifth strings lightly at the seventh fret and play. Croce played the same pattern (minus the harmonics) holding a Dm9 chord at the sixth fret.
