Twangy vocals, lost love, and a thick steel-string sound make Pure Prairie League's "Amie" a timeless country-rock classic. Recorded for the band's 1972 effort, *Bustin' Out*, the song expresses ambivalent feelings about an ex-flame, eventually cooling into a fancy fingerpicking outro that reprises "Falling In and Out of Love," an earlier track on the same record.

After an opening vamp on A and a brief series of syncopated chords, the song

settles into a steady boom-chuck strum pattern with emphasis on beats two and four of each 4/4 measure. Though they might look a little excessive, the four choruses really contain the heart of this song (particularly with the right mix of capable singers to tackle the harmony parts). Don't be scared away by the thick chord names shown on the outro (or the multitracked guitar parts in the original recording!)—we've included chord diagrams and a simplified picking pattern to help guide you through the section.
