Like the Beatles' music, some chord progressions just never quite go out of style. So it is with the opening (and recurring) I-vi-ii-V pattern that helps propel the jazzy stride of "I Will." Heard in hundreds of jazz standards and blues turnarounds, the classic progression (in this case, F-Dm-Gm7-C7) is played here by a jangly acoustic guitar, and serves as one of the many


highlights of the Beatles' immortal White Album.

To play the chord changes as the Beatles did, use a regular (and even unrelenting)

eighth-note rhythm pattern. Strumming downup with your thumb will give you a muted tone similar to the one on the recording, although playing eighth-note downstrokes with a pick sounds great, as well.

If you'd like to get deeper into the tune, try playing around with the arpeggiated riffs that appear after each verse section. Each riff is a bit different than the one before, so listen carefully-the lead line that occurs after verse two even continues throughout the bridge. We've transcribed the riff that follows verse one to help get you started.
