Sweet Jane

If asked, you could probably name about a million pop/rock tunes with stronger melodies than the Velvet Underground's "Sweet Jane" (from 1970's Loaded) but you'd be hard pressed to name a song with more swagger. Vocalist Lou Reed serves these lyrics with self-confidence so over the top that he blurs the line between song and spoken word.

While the vocal delivery is anything but regular, the unmistakable guitar groove gives this song a perfectly solid foundation. The same riff carries throughout the chorus, although the steady two-chord pattern shown here (played by an acoustic guitar in the track's left channel) gives the section an extra bit of drive that helps separate it from the verses. Also presented here are chords for the song's bridge section, though on some older versions of Loaded, the song ends after the third chorus, omitting the bridge. The full version presented here clocks in around 4:09.

The Velvet Underground also released a stripped-down recording of "Sweet Jane" on the band's album 1969: The Velvet Underground Live. The live, down-tempo version features a different set of lyrics and a somewhat simplified chord progression, but it includes a similar syncopation throughout the verse and chorus sections, as well as a bridge section analogous to the original. That alternate take on the song inspired Canadian alternative-rock band Cowboy Junkies' noteworthy cover, which first appeared on the group's breakout 1988 album, The Trinity Session.
