Make Me a Pallet On Your Floor

Mississippi John Hurt originally recorded "Make Me a Pallet on Your Floor" in December 1928 under the title "Ain't No Tellin'." The exact origins of the melody are unknown, but it was probably a fairly well-known tune when Hurt recorded it. Like most everything he recorded, Hurt made the song his

own with lyrics that differ considerably from other versions and an aggressive fingerpicking accompaniment, which in this case conveys a sense of motion that suits the traveling theme of the song.

Those with a keen ear will immediately recognize the C-E7-F chord sequence from Elizabeth Cotten's "Freight Train" and other folk songs such as "Railroad Bill." "Make Me a Pallet" has been recorded by dozens of musicians, including Hoyt Axton, Jerry Garcia, and Doc Watson, whose version of the song is the closest, lyrically, to the one Hurt recorded in the early 1960s. This version is from Hurt's first studio album for Vanguard, Today! (which may be the finest record he ever made), and uses several classic John Hurt licks. The trickiest move is getting the melody lick in the second measure of the E7 chord (bar 10) to flow in rhythm. Hurt was fond of hammer-ons and he used variations of this lick in many of his tunes, including "Slidin' Delta" and "Avalon, My Home Town."
