The Water Is Wide

In the 1950s, jazz guitarist Johnny Smith recorded a haunting solo guitar arrangement of the folk song, "Black Is the Color of My True Love's Hair." This demonstrated that when used judiciously, new reharmonization techniques can be applied to folk songs with gorgeous results. I've used some of these techniques to create a new arrangement of the traditional tune "The Water Is Wide," taking care to retain the song's intrinsic character.

In this arrangement, most of the song's original chords have been slightly altered to enrich the harmonies supporting the melody. For example, in measures 2 and 3, I've substituted an Emaj7 and an Emaj13 chord for the original E triad. I've also harmonized some melody notes with passing chords not found in the original, such as the D*dim chord in measure 1 which approaches the Emaj7 in measure 2.

The basic form of the tune is more or less intact, with a few deviations. In measure 16, for example, I've inserted a four-measure jazz turnaround to delay the V chord (B7-9 in measure 19). I've also delayed the resolution to the concluding I chord with the addition of a Cmaj7 chord in measure 21 and an Fmaj7+11 in measure 22.

Most people play this song in 4/4 time but to get a different feel, I've arranged it in 3/4. Phrasing is crucial to this arrangement, and it's vital that you play it with a very relaxed and flexible tempo. Feel free to hold notes longer than their indicated value, particularly at the end of melodic phrases. Take care to draw out and emphasize the melody, which—despite its revamped setting—remains the essence of this beautiful song.
