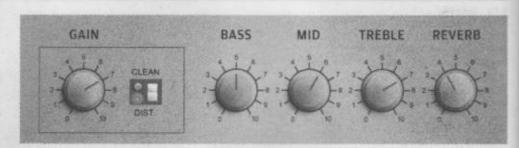
"Savin' Me" Nickelback

KEY NOTES Appearing in the intro as well as the verses, Riff A sounds simple but may actually be a bit difficult to finger. For the Bomaj13 chord, depress the 8th and 7th frets with your 4th and 3rd fingers. respectively. Then, for the Fsus2-the trickiest spothammer on the 3rd-fret F with your 1st finger and, keeping it there, add the 7th-fret A with your 4th finger. Isolate this move and repeat it until you don't feel like you're straining to make that four-fret stretch. For the Gsus2 chord, keep

your 4th finger in place and move your 1st finger up to the 5th-fret A. Relocate your 4th finger to the 8th-fret F to make the Dm(add4) chord. And on beat 4 of bar 2, while you're picking the open strings, pre-fret the 6th-string



Bb, to prepare for the Bbmail 3 chord in bar 3. Make sure that all these notes sound at equal volume and ring throughout.

The rest of the rhythm work is fairly straightforward: basic

> barre chords on acoustic, and one-finger power chords on the electric. (For the latter, you can use any one of your fret-hand fingers to barre the bottom three strings). Falling entirely within the D natural minor scale

(D-E-F-G-A-Bb-C), the solo is also pretty basic. Just make sure your pitch is dead-on for the 1st-finger G-string bends in the first several bars, and for the last high bend use either your 4th or 3rd fret-hand finger, reinforced by the finger or fingers above it.

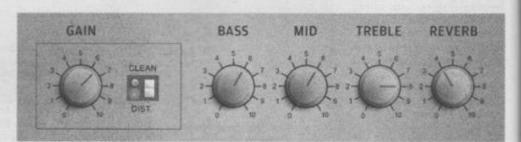
BIG PICTURE Although "Savin" Me" was recorded with at least three guitars, it can be played with just one electric. It's simple: for the intro and verses, use a clean tone and play the acoustic part; for the choruses (0:42 and 1:36), kick on some distortion and play the power chords. In the transcription, the first four bars of the first two choruses are lacking an electric part, so refer to the third chorus (2:44) for the appropriate power chords. As for the solo, just go for itdon't worry about the rhythm parts, as the harmony will be implied by your bassist's lines. This change in texture will also make your lead lines stand out. -ADAM PERLMUTTER

All the Right

KEY NOTES Tony Iommi's opening riff in "Paranoid" uses the power chord (in this case, E5) in its simplest form: played by just two fingers. The most important note in any chord is its root-the pitch that names the chordand you should be able to recognize the 6th string's 12th fret as the note E, from which the E5 gets its name. The other chords in the song (D5, C5, and G5) can be similarly identified; fret them all with your 1st finger on

the lower note and your 3rd finger on the higher note. Be sure to add some palm muting (P.M.) in the verses. Palm muting is achieved by laying the "karate edge" of your pick hand across the strings where they meet



the bridge saddles. Done correctly, it will create a percussive sound without totally choking

the strings.

Iommi's solo, meanwhile, is in E minor pentatonic (E-G-A-B-D) and is an excellent example of how to weave different scale positions together seamlessly. He begins in 7th position, on the middle strings; drops to 5th, on the lower strings; returns to 7th; ascends to 9th; and winds up, at last, in 12th. Notice that Iommi uses slides to transition between positions.

BIG PICTURE Paranoid is an album that marks the birth of heavy metal, and the title cut shows why: its power chords, palm muting, and pentatonic-

minor moves are all key to the genre's sound. "Paranoid" also set the tone for tone. Early metal guitarists often relied on British 100watt tube amps with no gain control-which meant that the only way to get the requisite crunch was to turn up, and use a bridgeposition humbucker set close to the strings. For solos, they would typically add a fuzz box, as Iommi does here. --- DOUGLAS BALDWIN

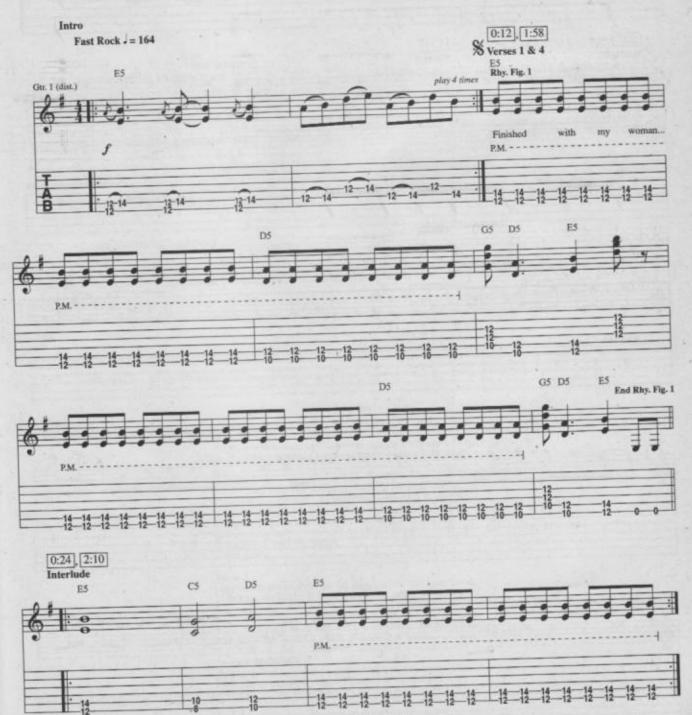

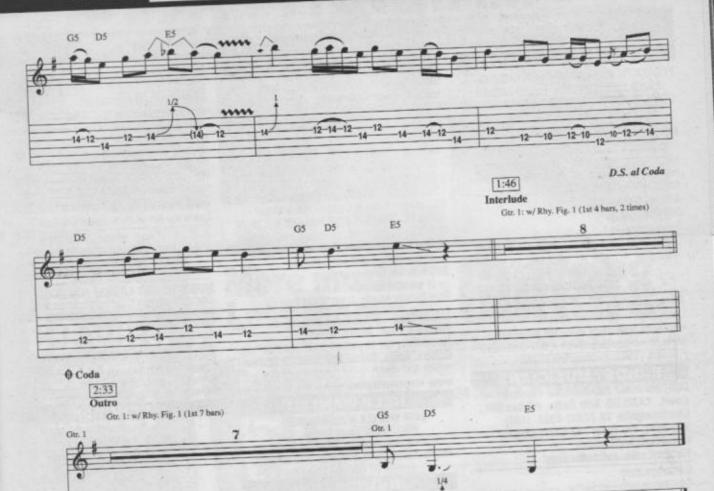
