## Samson and Delilah

Words and music by Reverend Gary Davis



The Reverend Gary Davis recorded many versions of "Samson and Delilah," and this one came from his 1965 performance at the Newport Folk Festival. Davis was 69 years old, but he could still nimbly pick those signature bass lines and project his huge voice over the top to provide a rousing performance.

In the transcription below, Davis' right-hand thumb strokes are notated with downstems while his fingers are notated with

upstems (just as they are throughout the examples). Notice how he provides much of the driving rhythm with the thumb, sometimes leaving the fingers out for several measures at a time. As a general rule, use your thumb for almost every note

on the beat and fingers to pinch along with the thumb or to fill in the eighth-note subdivisions on the offbeats. The major exception is in measure 55, where Davis plays one of his favorite rolls. To play the roll like Davis does, play two notes in a row with your thumb on beat two, and follow that with two notes in a row with your fingers on beat three. In measure 63, notice how he doubles the vocal melody with a bent note on the sixth fret.

On the final chorus, Davis alternates finger snaps and toe taps with a hammered bass line performed with his fretting hand. The "Fill on Final Chorus" shows Davis's fret-hand hammers, and the trickiest move is pulling off from the fifth string to sound the open fourth string in the first measure.


